


Support and Revenue Breakdown:

FOOD BANK



This year has been full of wonderful memories as we continue to serve our clients an amazing selection of donated foods thanks to all of our partners and supporters. We weathered many changes in our donor and volunteer base, and found creative ways to adapt due to the tireless efforts of our volunteers.



Union Church has provided consistent support throughout this year. They have picked up food for the food bank, bagged our donations, and fed clients at the Hygiene Center. We feel very lucky to have such dedicated partners! Sage, the new volunteer manager of the hospitality center, maintains the tradition of offering hot beverages and food to those waiting in line for the food bank. It is such a joy to welcome and care for our clients in this way. We also mourned together the loss of our pianist Cora, who passed away this winter. We strive to honor her spirit by serving our clients with as much compassion as she shared with all those who knew her.

This year our food bank received more than 186,014 pounds of food, which fed 6008 clients and our core of volunteers, who consisted of more than 80 individuals and gave over 3255 hours of their time to keep the food bank doors open. We also brought in more than 20 new volunteers this year, welcoming groups from Microsoft and Everett Catholic Church to feed the hungry. We held a volunteer party over the holidays and raffled away gifts to our volunteers in gratitude for their hard work. We are continually appreciative of the generosity that enables us to feed those in need in our community and alleviate the burdens of so many.

- More than 186,000 pounds of food were distributed in 2015.



HYGIENE CENTER

Monday through Friday from 8:00 am until noon, our Hygiene Center is open for business. Homeless men and women are welcome to come into our gym for a hot shower and a dry place to rest. We also provide laundry services and hot coffee. On Mondays, we are able to offer food (sandwiches, salads, yogurt, and more) donated by Amazon.

In 2015, we renewed our contract with the Mental Health Chaplaincy to bring their Companion Outreach Program to our Hygiene Center. Peer Support Specialists trained to provide companionship worked with many of our clients to foster healing and self-advocacy with the goal of transitioning them into a more safe and healthy environment.

COMMUNITY LUNCH

On the last Sunday of every month, ICS opens its doors and serves a nutritious hot lunch prepared by Janet and many volunteers who offer to help. We typically serve 150–175 people, and members of the congregation of Immanuel Lutheran come and join with others for this monthly meal. It is a good time for community-building and breaking bread together. Much of the food is donated, but some food is purchased each month to create a balanced meal.

RECOVERY PROGRAM



For men who are homeless and suffering from addictions to drugs and or alcohol, ICS offers a unique opportunity to live in a supportive clean and sober shelter while they work on their recovery. We have space for 15 men at a time, and most stay with us an average of nine months. We provide them with a mat on the gym floor, a locker for their belongings, lots of good food, and even more love!

The men are required to attend weekday classes at the Matt Talbot Center, our partner for decades. In the evenings and weekends, we are their home. They take turns cooking, cleaning and providing security for the building, and in exchange, they are warmly welcomed by the congregation of Immanuel Lutheran Church. Upon completion of their

program, the men find housing, many of them next door to us at Williams Apartments or at the Traugott Apartments next to Matt Talbot.
